




2021 Goals


Employee FTE Totals by Fiscal Year






Appropriations

FY 2022 Request

\$229,190 for 5 additional meat inspectors

- Expect 11 new state inspected plants online by early 2021 and a total of 15 new plants by end of year
- Currently have 17 inspectors; Expect increased capacity to require 22 inspectors for FY 2022
- Additional inspectors will:
 - > Allow new plants and their producer-customers to market meat at retail in Oklahoma
 - > Allow existing plants to increase their processing capacity of state inspected meat to meet current demand
- USDA FSIS may reimburse the state for up to 50% of the cost of state inspection.
