What is a booking photo?

Georgia § 35-1-19 definition:


"a photograph or image of an individual taken by an arresting law enforcement agency for the purpose of identification or taken when such individual was processed into a jail".

Other states have similar definitions.

Booking Photo Legislation Introduced 2012-2022

- Booking photos have been around nearly as long as cameras.
- Webpages displaying digital booking photos for commercial gain emerged in 2011.
- Many webpages used computer automation to scrape law enforcement webpages to transfer photos without human assistance. Other photos were obtained through public records requests.
- Postings don't always contain case outcomes or complete information.

Introduced Booking Photo Legislation






Booking Photo Legislation Enacted 2012-2022

- Many webpages charged fees; a practice specifically prohibited by early legislation.
- As fees were prohibited, webpage traffic was still key for paid advertisements for other services or to drive newspaper traffic.
- Two first amendment questions: (1)
 Right to access; (2) Right to publish.
- Access to photos governed by state public records laws.

Enacted Booking Photo Legislation







Legislative Approaches



- Restricting access to photos based on intended use.
- Limiting law enforcement web posting.
- Prohibiting fees for removal from commercial webpages.
- Requiring removal in specified circumstances.
- Requiring additional accurate information about disposition of the matter.
- Explicitly outlining public access.

Other Non-Legislative Actions

- Credit card companies cut ties to limit payment.
- Search engine optimization changes to reduce prominence of the sites.
- Copyright or litigation.
