Cell Phone Free Schools

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Phone Free Classrooms/Schools - 14 years history/data

1. 2010-12- Midway Public Schools

- a. No phones in buildings
- b. 149 day calendar
- c. Ranked #4 out of 18 regional schools on OPI scores
- d. Consolidated with Boynton-Moton in 11/12 school year (closed due to poor performance)

2. 2012-18 & 2019-24 Warner Public Schools

- a. No phones in buildings
- b. Moved from #15 of 18 regional schools to consistent top 15 state school
- c. Less than 110 cell phone violations

3. 2018-19 Sallisaw Public Schools

- a. No phones in classes
- b. Phones allowed during lunch

4. 2024-25 Pocola Public Schools

- a. No phones in classrooms (hallways and lunch permitted)
- b. Decreased discipline & vandalism

School Culture- Positive Student Impacts due to Cell Phone Free Schools

- 1. Reduction in fighting/bullying/harassment
 - a. Reduced opportunities for "viral" fights/altercations
 - b. Better student health as anxiety is reduced
 - i. Students report not being as worried about negative posts on social media
- 2. Reduction in vandalism
 - a. TikTok Trends
 - b. Social Media Trends
- 3. Students learn math facts
 - a. Are not able to rely on PhotoMath, WolframAlpha, etc
- 4. Students transition to reading/independent practice vs cell phones
 - a. Students read library books once finished with work instead of being on phones
- 5. Improved performance on state assessments
 - a. Students felt prepared to succeed

School Culture- Teacher Impacts in Cell Phone Free Schools

- 1. TLE- Evaluation Conferences produced following results consistently
 - a. Teachers felt safe
 - b. Reported not being worried about being "set-up" by students
 - c. Empowered to teach bell to bell
 - d. Were not fighting the distraction of cell phones and students off-task
- 2. Teachers LOVED not fighting cell phones
 - a. Improved teacher retention (did not want to return to schools who allowed cell phone use)
- 3. Average or Struggling teachers improved
 - a. At Warner, teachers with a 55-80% success rate, grew to greater than 90% with removal of cell phones and consistent learning environment
- 4. Relationships are better
 - a. Students interact more with teacher vs being on their cell phones

Campus Free vs Classroom Free Differences

- 1. Hallways empty quicker in campus free environments
 - a. Students stand in hallways or restrooms on phones when phones are allowed on campus
 - b. Bell ringers are able to be started quicker because students enter classrooms quicker
- 2. Lunch Time- Authentic Conversations in campus free
 - a. Students speak to each other vs heads down in games and social media
 - b. Less stress (one student reported not having to worry about who was trying to talk to his girlfriend)
 - c. Students play games and interact with each other instead of playing on phones
- 3. Commons areas/Restrooms
 - a. Reduced issues in areas when students do not have cell phones at all

Personal Historical Conclusions

- 1. Schools should be Cell Phone Free to improve student academic outcomes.
- 2. We will need legislative assistance to improve student learning in all 77 counties. Many local boards and/or administrators will not make the change independently.
- 3. The more the restriction on cell phones, the greater the increase in student achievement.
- 4. Student mental health seemed to improve where cell phones were more restricted.
- 5. Parent concerns regarding contact in an emergency situation could create an unsafe environment if students are hiding, speaking on phone or phone is ringing in an active shooter situation.
