The mission of this agency is to protect the public by regulating the practice of osteopathic medicine in the State of Oklahoma through education and licensing requirements and to ensure that each licensee practices osteopathic medicine within the provisions of the Osteopathic Medicine Act. The Territorial Board of Examiners existed prior to statehood. This mission was adopted by the first Osteopathic Board of Examiners shortly after the legislature established the agency in 1921.

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The Board President appoints committees as needed. However, such committees are advisory only. All decisions are made by the Board sitting en banc.

GOVERNANCE ACCOUNTABILITY:

The statute does not provide for an attendance policy. Attendance by Board members has never been a problem.

Notably, the staff responsible for licensing has not changed in size in the last seventeen (17) years even though the number of licensees has doubled during that time. Computerization of licensing and renewal procedures account for that cost savings. The Board has approved conversion of all license and discipline files from paper to electronic form. It is expected the initial outlay for the project will eventually be recovered in cost, equipment and personnel savings.

CORE MISSION:

All services we provide are central to our mission. No other agency or entity performs the functions we perform. The Board has been steadfastly and efficiently providing these services for the past ninety-three (93) years.

PRIVATE ALTERNATIVES:

The Osteopathic Board is the only entity in the nation that licenses osteopathic physicians to practice osteopathic medicine in the state of Oklahoma. The Board is also the only entity that disciplines osteopathic physicians for violations of the Osteopathic Medicine Act. Licensing physicians has never been subject to privatization. Private industry is not suited to handle either licensure or discipline of physicians.
