



## In the last decade, 32 states have reduced both crime and imprisonment rates; Oklahoma has not.

States That Reduced Both Crime and Imprisonment Rates Between 2006 and 2016



□ The 10 Oklahoma Counties with the most fatal drug-overdose rates are all rural. ☐ The ten counties with the highest rate of people reporting frequent mental distress are all rural **□Only 1** in ten people in rural communities are receiving treatment ☐ Rural disparities are often missed in legislation. (Pittsburg County) ☐ Even larger counties like Rogers County are often missed (SB 252- Median jail stay nonviolent felons- 183 days)









## OKLAHOMA INCARCERATION RATES BY RACE/ETHNICITY, 2010
